Dear Members of our Parish Family:

On behalf of the Parish Finance Committee, this letter describes the financial results and statement of condition for our parish for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020. For reporting purposes, we have isolated from the table below, to the extent possible, the *For God's Glory* capital campaign from the general operations of the parish. Further, as construction has been completed, the parish is now incurring substantial depreciation expense (a non-cash item) that impacts our overall financial results therefore we have broken that out in the financial results presented here.

#### Summary

As the pandemic took hold in the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter of our fiscal year, the uncertain times caused the Parish to operate cautiously given the unknown environment. And frankly the bottom line proves how generous and supportive you all have been to our parish. As I write this report, you will notice the common term of "flat year over year" throughout the analysis and commentary and in these uncertain times that is a welcome outcome.

For the fiscal year, Total Revenue of \$2.6 million was approximately flat year over year. On the revenue side, education revenue and parish weekly offertory collections were essentially equal to the prior year. While the offertory has been flat for more than several years now, we were very pleased to "hold our own" especially given the uncertain times. Further, bequests or special gifts totaled \$73,000 for this fiscal year, up over no bequests the prior year. Activities, net revenue, reported a decrease of \$58,800 year over year – due solely to the inability to hold spring fund raisers especially the FunFest. Other revenue had a year over year increase of \$7,600 due primarily to an insurance claim recovery. Bottom line, revenue was up 1.3% year over the prior fiscal year.

The parish's single largest expense continues to be the catholic education of our parish children. Parish education support includes our parish school, youth catechesis education, and high school secondary support. The parish's net contribution to all facets of education was \$561,500 for the 2020 fiscal year, a decrease of \$67,700 or approximately 14%. Our parish school enrollment had been stable and the good news is for the 2020-21 school year enrollment is up 4% - even in the midst of the pandemic. "Retention and recruitment" efforts remain a focus for the School Advisory Board to assure long term viability of the school. The pre-school was at full enrollment for the fiscal year but for the current year enrollment is limited by Covid restrictions. The Parish Finance Committee continues to work with the School Advisory Board to gradually reduce the parish financial commitment to the school. Growing enrollment helps this effort immensely. Further, the parish continues to watch its own operating expenses very carefully during these uncertain times. The combined parish staff and parish operations expense decreased \$90,400 or 14% year over year. Again, the bottom line on total expenses, were flat year over year.

As the pandemic hit and the economic situation became cloudy, the parish was eligible and did participate in the SBA Payroll Protection Program taking out a borrowing of \$424,700. During the spring closures, the parish continued to pay all employees regardless of whether they were able to work or not. We have submitted our documentation for loan forgiveness. With the construction essentially completed on the *For God's Glory* project, as of June 30, 2020 the parish now has debt of \$1.5 million, which will be repaid from the financial pledges to be received over the life of pledges (generally three more years). Our parish savings account stands at \$111,600, an increase of \$19,100 or 21% over the prior fiscal year end.

Our 942 registered parishioners are the foundation of St. Catharine and we are very blessed to have so many involved and supporting families who step up when called upon—either in time, talent or treasure. We thank everyone for their financial support of our parish. We look forward to keeping you posted on our financial position and results.
