

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"Do This in Remembrance of Me" A Step-By-Step Walk Through the Mass

+ Part 28: The Creed as Profession of Faith +

What does the word **Creed** mean? According to Fr. Guy Oury, "A Latin word for the Creed is *symbolum*. Its first meaning is that of a sign, a mark of recognition by which an envoy is accredited or strangers know each other as belonging to the same group. The 'symbol' of faith identifies Christians. People who are not Christian cannot profess it without a lie on their part" (*The Mass*, p. 71). In addition to being a sign of our unity, the Creed also is a summary of core doctrines we believe in and an important part of the Mass.

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal states, "The purpose of the Creed or Profession of Faith is that the whole gathered people may respond to the Word of God proclaimed in the readings taken from Sacred Scripture and explained in the Homily and that they may also honor and confess the great mysteries of the faith by pronouncing the rule of faith in a formula approved for liturgical use and before the celebration of these mysteries in the Eucharist begins" (*GIRM*, no. 67). In summary, Charles Belmonte says, "The symbol or Creed expresses our response and assent to what we have just heard in the readings and in the homily" (*Understanding the Mass*, p. 99). Having heard the truths of the Faith in the Liturgy of the Word, now we profess them in the Creed.

Stand and Profess

Why do we stand up to profess our Faith? As the Diocese of Peoria teaches, "Through the Creed, we as a community of believers stand and profess, in precise terms, the foundations of our faith. We stand for the Creed because of its importance in our Church and in our lives. Of important note is another gesture the Church asks of us as we profess the Creed. As we say '[and by] the Holy Spirit [was incarnate] of the Virgin Mary and became man,' we are to bow in adoration of the Incarnation and birth of our Lord. Interestingly, on those respective solemnities (Annunciation and Christmas) we are to retain the ancient custom of genuflecting during those lines" ("A Study of the Mass," p. 10). As we have reviewed previously, each of the gestures and postures within the liturgy has a meaning and can help us pray more deeply.

Throughout the Mass, we stand together for the principal prayers. In a very practical way, standing is another way of giving our assent, as when a crowd stands in applause. Standing adds an additional fervor to the recognition. In a similar way, standing to pray together adds an element of strength to the words we proclaim. Bowing while we recall the Incarnation acknowledges in a humble way how much we honor that significant moment in world history. Genuflecting on the Solemnities of the Annunciation and Christmas adds even more solemn praise to the joy of that moment, reflecting our adoration of our Lord who took on a human nature, becoming man for our sake.

As we profess our faith together, we are joined in a unity that began at our Baptism. "As on the day of our Baptism, when our whole life was entrusted to the 'standard teaching,' let us embrace the Creed of our life-giving faith. To say the Credo with faith is to enter into communion with God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and also with the whole Church which transmits the faith to us and in whose midst we believe" (CCC, no. 197). The *Catechism* quotes St. Ambrose: "The Creed is the spiritual seal, our hearts' meditation and ever-present guardian; it is, unquestionably, the treasure of our soul" (*CCC*, no. 197).

Reflecting upon St. Ambrose's words recalls for me the amazing gift we have been given through our Baptism, being invited into the very life of God. That is definitely worth standing up and professing together!

For Reflection:

- 1. Consider your posture(s) during various forms of prayer. What prompts you to stand in respect and fervor? What leads you to bow your hand in awe and wonder? Pay attention to praying with your whole self, including your bodily posture.
- 2. The next time you pray the Creed alone, call to mind your unity with all Christians who profess this faith.

- thanked a donor to the atrium by working on a star project


Looking ahead to this month:

The Long Weekend, Super Sunday, or Double Christmas how will you do Mass this Dec. 25?



Though most Catholics (hopefully!) don't primarily think of going to Mass in terms of an "obligation," we wanted to provide a little more clarity on how to carry out our Christian duty to worship God on the **Fourth Sunday of Advent** and **Christmas**.

While there are many different Mass times available, <u>it's not — never — possible to fulfill them both with</u> <u>one (1) single Mass.</u>

Two obligations means two Masses.

With Advent shrunk to the shortest possible count of days, we get a little less time for seasonal anticipation, but we also get a back-to-back call to the festive celebration of Mass.

Christmas Day is, of course, a holy day of obligation, and the fact that it falls on a Monday doesn't change the usual Sunday precept for us to attend Mass the day before.

Option 1: Two for two

Many Catholics will opt for simply going to their usual morning Mass on successive days — first on Sunday, December 24th for the Fourth Sunday of Advent at 8:30am or 11:00am, and then on Monday, December 25th for Christmas at 11:00am.

It's easy to remember, simple to plan around, and the no-nonsense solution. Two obligations, two Masses, two days, Sunday and Monday.

Option 2: 'Vigil' all the way

There is, of course, more than one way to go to Mass twice in two days.

On Saturday, December 23rd you could attend a Vigil Mass for the Fourth Sunday of Advent at another local parish, and then on Sunday, December 24th a Christmas Eve Mass at St. Catharine at 4:00pm, 6:30pm, or 10:00pm.

Option 3: The long weekend

You could opt for a Saturday, December 23rd Mass for the Fourth Sunday of Advent at another local parish, and then go for morning Mass at 11:00am on Christmas Day, essentially giving yourself a day off in between celebrations.

Option 4: Super Sunday

Not for the faint-hearted, but instead of spreading your Eucharistic obligations across three days, you could opt to pack them all into one Super Sunday, December 24th.

To do that, you would go to 8:30am or 11:00am Sunday morning Mass for the Fourth Sunday of Advent, and then to Mass again, 4:00pm, 6:30pm, or 10:00pm, for a Christmas Eve Mass.

Option 5: Double Christmas

If you really want to maximize your carol singing chances, and double down on nativity narratives for the Gospel reading, you could opt for two Christmas Masses.

The Sunday obligation — that Catholics attend weekly Masses on the Lord's Day — is one of those cases in which "liturgical time" and of-the-clock-time don't exactly overlap, at least sometimes.

Catholics are obliged to attend Mass every Sunday, including the Fourth Sunday of Advent. And they are obliged to go to Mass for the feast of Christmas. Those two obligations are distinct, and have to be met separately — but there's no rule mandating that the Mass Catholics attend for their Sunday obligation actually be celebrated liturgically for the Fourth Sunday of Advent.

So you could attend back-to-back Mass on Christmas Eve, or a Christmas Eve Mass and Mass on Christmas Day, and have satisfied both your Sunday and Christmas Day obligations.

Of course doing so would mean missing out on the final Advent liturgy, and trim your anticipatory experience of Advent back even further than the calendar already is — but that's absolutely a valid option.

Whatever your plans for Christmas, please, pick one of the options above, and get to Mass. Twice. We'll see you there.
